Serving on the TVARA Board

During my career at TVA, I took for granted the work of the TVA Retirement System Board of Directors and staff. Not anymore.

I am honored to serve as the appointed retiree member on the TVARS Board and to have an opportunity to ensure that the benefits we all worked hard for are delivered as promised.

TVARS serves more than 23,000 retirees and beneficiaries.

Before my appointment in April 2007, my initial impression of TVARS was that it was moving in the right direction.

After serving on the board for the past 13 months, I am thoroughly convinced that the retirement system is financially sound and in great shape, thanks to TVA Vice President of Retirement Services Randy Snyder and his very capable management team.

All of my colleagues on the Board are just as committed to the safety and soundness of the system.

While our approaches sometimes might be different, our spirit and intent for the system appears to be the same.

The No. 1 question I have heard from employees and retirees since joining the board is, "Is the retirement system safe and sound?"

My answer is a resounding "Yes."

I haven't seen anything in my short tenure to indicate otherwise.

In fact, it is quite impressive to now see the safeguards that have been put into the rules and regulations of TVARS over the years.

Much gratitude and thanks should go to those board members who have served before me.

The TVARS Board is made up of three elected employee members, three members appointed by TVA, and one retiree member selected by the other six members.

The board annually has four regular scheduled meetings, two workshops, and numerous committee

meetings to take care of the system's business.

All board members serve on at least three of the four board committees.


The committees consist of the Investment Committee, chaired by Phil Reynolds; the Retirement Committee, chaired by Janet Herrin; the Election Committee, chaired by Leonard Muzyn; and the Audit Committee, which I chair.

All board members serve on the Investment Committee.

Most of the board actions and discussions come through the various committees.

Some of the TVARS Board's most recent actions include the following:

- Review and approval of the Investment Performance report provided by our consultant, Wilshire, and review and approval of the actuary report provided by Mercer Human Resources.
- Upon the recommendation of the Audit Committee, the board selected Crowe Chizek and Company LLC to audit the system's financial statements for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 2007. You should have received the 2007 Annual Report by now.
- Based upon an analysis of the system's actuary, the TVARS Board approved and recommended to the TVA Board a contribution of \$75 million to the system for fiscal year 2008. The TVA Board approved this recommendation.
- The TVARS Board approved a cost-of-living increase of 2.53 percent for the retiree's pension benefits

and a 6-percent interest credit for calendar-year 2008 for participants in the cash-balance benefit structure.

- As of Sept. 30, 2007, the system's Fixed Benefit Fund assets continued to perform very well, appreciating about 14.5 percent for the year to an asset value of \$8 billion.

TVARS makes distributions to retirees totaling more than \$40 million monthly. That is why I am committed to working diligently on behalf of the retirement system to ensure that these benefits continue to be delivered.

In an effort to better serve you, I would like to keep the lines of communication open through articles in the TVARA newsletter and other means as appropriate to address issues and concerns.

Again, I am honored to serve as your Director on the TVARS Board, and I will continue to work hard to preserve the system.

BEING A PART OF A POWERFUL PAST

In May, TVA celebrated 75 years of legacy across the Tennessee Valley with a variety of events that marked its “Powerful Past.”

A repeated acknowledgement in these celebrations was the expression of a sincere appreciation for those who were part of that past — TVA’s many retirees.

A “Powerful Past” implies making a difference — something TVA retirees have done for the Valley and the world.

Being part of a powerful past is a role we all can claim. Without a doubt, we each experienced many moments in our TVA careers when we were “struck” with an overwhelmingly gratifying sensation — when we knew we were involved in something that was a part of what some call the “greater good.”

Take, for example, fellow retiree **Charles Wilson**.

Wilson still feels a passion many of us would consider a nightmare — he misses the sensation of being in dangerous positions in very high places.

After 39 years, he retired in January

2000 as a Line Foreman.

To him, being part of a powerful past meant carrying his talents into the future.

“Being able to go to all area line crews and show them how to be safe in doing dangerous tasks — bare-hand work on 500-kV lines while those lines were energized — was it,” Wilson says.

“Keeping all our people — workers and customers — safe while keeping the power delivered reliably to them is the priority.”

He recalls the feelings of a job well done for long, hard hours spent by him and others in the many, many line crews whose task was to locate and re-energize lines and to restore power lost in the 1993 blizzard.

There are more than 17,000 miles of transmission line in the TVA service area.

We should be thankful for the folks like Wilson, of today and yesterday, who ensure that the flip of a switch brings the promise of a “Bright Future.”

The vast majority of Wilson’s career

was based out of Cleveland, Tenn., where he lives and now serves as the Volunteer Coordinator for the Cleveland TVARA Chapter.

Although he still feels a fond connection with his powerful past of high places and even higher voltage, his work these days is closer to the ground, and the source of his energy is heart and muscle.

Staff: 11,659 employees

Hill Helped Customers Turn Lights on

Saying “Lights Out” in certain situations to Memphis TVARA Chapter member **Charles Willie Moses Hill** would be no laughing matter.

As it does to Hill’s peers at plants throughout the TVA system, loss of power means loss of “customer service.”

And for Allen Fossil Plant, that means a loss to TVA’s largest distributor customer, Memphis, Light, Gas and Water.

Hill retired in 2003 as Production Supervisor at Allen, having been with TVA for 26 years.

His reflective moment as “being part of a powerful past” came in 1999 during a plant blackout on the midnight shift.

“Due to the TVA training I had received, I was able to quickly determine the problem (an MLGW switch failure),” Hill says.

“And I was able to aid MLGW in clearing the problem and returning power to the plant.”

He is well aware that minutes mean a magnitude for the millions TVA power serves.

These days, duty to TVA has become duty to country, where Hill continues to serve a powerful role as Vice President in the Enlisted As-

sociation of the National Guard of Tennessee.

How Are Cheats Able To Charge Calls to My Phone?

First they call you, often posing as service technicians “testing” your phone line, or as police officers or emergency-room workers.

Depending on your service, they’ll ask you to dial *72, 72#, or 90#, each

of which activates your call-forwarding function, and then a phone number.

Scammers can then make long-distance calls from that number and bill them to you.

This ruse, doable on landlines or cell phones, “surrenders” your phone number to the scammers until you deactivate call forwarding, usually by dialing *73.

75th Anniversary Quilt

A beautiful work of art commissioned to commemorate TVA’s 75th Anniversary was proudly displayed at the TVARA Leadership Conference in Franklin, Tenn., in May.

The quilt was created by the owners of Creative Quilts of Tennessee and is a traditional Sawtooth Star pattern, which incorporates photographs in its design.
